

WHAT IS ABUSE?

ANY BEHAVIOR THAT IS DESIGNED TO CONTROL AND SUBJUGATE ANOTHER HUMAN BEING THROUGH THE USE OF FEAR, HUMILIATION, AND VERBAL OR PHYSICAL ASSAULT.



TYPES OF ABUSE

- Verbal: Yelling. Threats. Name calling. Constant criticism, put downs, and insults. Silent treatment.
- Psychological/emotional:
 Mind games, mental coercion, crazy making.
 Accusations, isolation, spying.

- Physical: Hitting, biting, shoving, slapping, etc.
- Sexual: Rape, forced sexual behavior, jokes or hurtful comments.
- Property: Destroying, throwing, kicking of walls, doors, furniture.
- Financial: controls, decides, lies about money.

TYPICAL CYCLE OF DOMESTIC ABUSE

- Abuse
- Guilt (not always)
- Rationalizes action
- Normal appearance
- Case building
- Planning
- Setup

RED FLAGS TO NOTICE WHEN DATING.

- Frequent angry outbursts
- Easily frustrated
- Impatient
- Feels he is a failure
- Promises to change his behavior
- Seems to show no guilt
- Displays anger against people, property, pets
- Parental abuse model

- Gets angry if you don't take his advice
- Is suspicious of your friendships
- Wants you with him and to know where you are
- Tries to push you into sex acts against your will
- Rigid role ideas
- Negative comments about women
